## On the slow road

Transplant survivor takes one step forward, two back $\underset{\text { Staff Writer }}{\text { By Brad Kadrich }}$ Joe Kelly was never a University of Michigan fan. But Kelly, sporting a slowly recovering from liver transplant, is happy to shout "Go Blue!" now. Kelly, a longtime CanUnisys employee, said he owes his life to, among others, the doctors and Michigan Hospital after surviving the surgery that replaced his non functioning liver.
"It's the most difficult thing I've ever had to go through," Kelly said. " U -M has one hell of a medical staff. You can take what they tell you to
the bank. I have a whole new appreciation for 'organ donor programs." is recent, his battle with liver disease is not. He was diagnosed with hepa titis in the early 1970s, gotten out of the U.S. Army. He was treated and released and didn't think much of it for the
next 20 years or so. When Unisys closed the Pennsylvania plant he was working at
around 1990 , Kelly was going to leave the compa ny. But he was offered an Mpportunity to move to Michigan and took it. icals turned up nothing about a malfunctioning liver and Kelly didn't really worry about it.
By 2012, his weight was good, he was walking
a lot and playing golf two
or three times a week-
like a healthy person. Bu inke a healthy person. But he was retaining fluid. The surprising diagn The Kellys were
shocked. shocked. "They told us cirrhosi can be dormant for a very long time," said Dorttie Kelly, whow works
at Mans Lumber in Can at Mans Lumber in Can-
ton. "It reared its ugly ton. "It reared its ugly went to hell in a hand
baske" basket." Kelly, who had been day, suddenly had no energy. He was trying to figure out "how to get my
energy level back," and energy level back, an Hospital in Ypsilanti told him to get checked out at

gerously low sodium gerously low sodium After being treated for one such episode, his doctor told him, " 0 K , we'll get you back on the
transplant list." The problem was, the couple never knew they were on the list to begin with.
Kelly can laugh about the incident - now. "I said, 'Doesn't that imply I'm already on the list?, he recalled. "He

ing). Trouble was, Kelly hadn't remembered much of the experience
and found he had to keep asking his wife where he
was and what was happening.
"I don't know that (the

said. "It was like being in your own reality, After I gour howne, I finally said
(to Dottie), foK tell (to Dottie,), 'OK, tell me
what I went through "' what I went through."'
Recovery has been slow, Kelly said. His legs were the last thing to go
and he's had trouble and he's had trouble to get around. He takes $15-20$ pills a day as he recovers and he's been taking shots to prevent
blood clots from traveling., Hets from trav-

But over time, throug such as the Voting Rights Act of 1965, the right to vote has been learly established. Men and women of all races, religious who are age 18 by election day are eligible to vote.

steps to be eligible to vote this year, including filling out the needed registration forms. It goes without saying that

tration deadline or didn't know how to register.
In Michigan, there are really only three requirements to reg
ister to vote:
Applicants must be 18 year of age by Election Day.
${ }^{\boldsymbol{D}}$ They must be a U.S. citizen. the city or township in which
they wish to register.
While the idea of National
Voter Registration Day is to get
as many people around the coum try as possible registered Sept.
24, the actual deadline to register to vote for Michigan's Noter to vote for Michigan's ioday, Oct. 7 .
And there are several ways to sign up. People can register by
mail, at their county city or mail, at their county, city or
township clerk's office or by visiting any Secretary of State branch. They can get informa-
